MONTGOMERY COUNTY BOARD OF EDUCATION MINUTES

March 5, 2018

The Montgomery County Board of Education convened in its regular monthly meeting on Monday, March 5, 2018 at 6:30 p.m. Board members present were Steven W. DeBerry – Chair, Tommy Blake – Vice Chair, Jesse Hill, Bryan Dozier, Ann Long, Tommy Blake, Sandra Miller and Shirley Threadgill.

Chairman DeBerry called the meeting to order and moved to adopt the agenda as shown. Ann Long made the motion with Sandra Miller seconding. The agenda was accepted with unanimous approval from the board.

Chairman DeBerry opened by reading a devotional reminding us to "go and do". Success requires activity.

Green Ridge Elementary student Lilly Greene led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America.



Katie Hursey presented a video of the winners of "So You Think Your School Rocks". The talent show is a joint endeavor of Communities in Schools and Montgomery County Schools. The event raised over eleven thousand dollars. The first place winner was Mt. Gilead Elementary. By placing first, Mt. Gilead will keep the money they raised to use at their school.

Green Ridge Elementary students discussed their school newspaper. The newspaper is a project of the fifth grade class. Under the eye of Assistant Principal, Sharon Castelli, the newspaper crew interviews the students, writes the articles and distributes the paper to students and staff once a month. Most students state that working on the newspaper has improved their

reading, speaking, typing and proofreading skills. Others say it has helped build teamwork and made them more responsible.

Superintendent Ellis brought before the board the premium positions that will be needed at Montgomery Central. As previously discussed, only the best possible people will be hired for positions at the new high school. Dr. Ellis states that the positions will require a "level of planning and investment beyond what we currently do from an operational standpoint". Positions needed include Principal, Teacher/Head Football Coach, Teacher/Head Basketball Coach, Teacher/Band Director, Teacher/Athletic Director, Engineering Instructor, Lead Counselor, Facilities Manager and Lead Custodian, with others to be determined. The board advised Dr. Ellis to proceed as necessary.

Next, Dr. Ellis brought before the board the new "See Something, Say Something" initiative. Area police departments, the sheriff's department and Montgomery County Schools have joined forces to ask the community to report any suspicious activity, behavior or threats that may affect our school system. Posters asking the community to "look, listen, be alert and stay safe" will be placed in our schools and in area businesses. These posters will list phone numbers to the sheriff's office, all town police departments and Montgomery County Schools. Dr. Ellis said, "We have been fortunate in the past, that when we have had issues, it has been stopped because someone reported it".

Dr. Takeda Legrand presented a Diversity and Inclusion update. A survey was posted online asking for input on MCS diversity management. Responses were collected from all schools, staff, board members and the community. After reviewing the data, the administration team set goals with objectives for our diversity plan. Goals include increasing cultural awareness of all teachers, administrators, staff and students, recruiting, hiring and retaining teachers, administrators and staffs of color, increasing diverse community parent and business stakeholder engagement and developing a comprehensive instructional plan that is inclusive and reflects diversity. Other goals include increasing participation of all students in all curriculum or extracurricular activities, and to reduce the overuse of discipline practices that remove students from the classroom.

Dr. Lancaster presented the Montgomery County Early College school calendar for 2018-19 for review. The calendar will be up for approval at the April meeting.

During Superintendent Remarks, Dr. Ellis read \$100 Million and Counting. It reads:

"One of our goals this year has been to prepare a marketing plan so that we can do a better job of telling the MCS story to our many stakeholders. As part of that effort, I am going to use the Superintendent comments from time to time to better tell the MCS story. I am going to start this month and focus on additional funding. Not the funding we normally get, but additional funding, the lifeblood of any organization that wants to survive, grow, and thrive.

One of the challenges any small, rural district faces is funding. If you tell me that a district is small and rural, I can tell you that socio-economic status is going to be a challenge. Poverty is going to be a challenge. When I started this job in September 2010, the Board of Education had one overarching goal and one charge for me as Superintendent above all others, "we need more funding." If you know anything else about 2010, you will know the country and the state was in the middle of one of the worst economic downturns since the stock market crash of 1929. Needless to say, the thought that we wanted to increase funding and provide more services to students in such an environment probably seemed an insurmountable task to many. But, under

the leadership of this Board of Education, much has been accomplished since 2010, with more on the horizon between now and 2020. While battling some of the most challenging budget times in 8 decades, starting in 2010, MCS has been awarded \$100 million in additional funding for our students.

There are many people that helped make all of this possible. We have established strong partnerships with the County Commissioners and the community college. We had help from taxpayers in the passage of a 1/4 cent sales tax. And we received grants, many grants that provided additional programming, training for teachers, and a 1:1 technology initiative for all students. To break it down it its simplest form, since 2010: MCS has received \$15 million in the form of numerous programmatic grants and associated in-kind donations to help all of our students. MCS received \$4 million from the 1/4 cent sales tax that was used to obtain QSCB funding that replaced our middle school roofs and provided capital improvements to all of our other schools in one way or another. This line of funding has also helped provide \$3 million for the addition of a wing at East Middle School. First Health built two brand new health centers on our middle school campuses and now two brand new dental clinics at a cost of almost \$2 million. And we now are in the process of beginning construction on a brand new state of the art high school and a new advanced Career and Technical Education building that will help with economic development in Montgomery County for decades to come. That comes in the form of a USDA loan and a commitment to education from our County Commissioners in the amount of almost \$76 million.

When you put it all together, that is \$100 million in additional funding for MCS in the decade from 2010-2020. That money provides jobs for Montgomery County citizens now and well into the future. It is definitely a celebration. No other school or system I am aware can say that they have invested more in student success than Montgomery County during this current decade. We have several grants in the hopper and I have no doubt that amount will climb even higher by the time the decade closes in 2020.

The list of people we need to thank for all of this is so long that I am sure I will miss someone, but I am going to give it a shot. I apologize beforehand for anyone I missed. Our thanks go to: All taxpayers of Montgomery County, The Administration of Montgomery County and our Board of County Commissioners, the Board of Trustees at Montgomery Community College, The Montgomery Fund, The Montgomery County Sheriff's Office, The Montgomery County Health Department, The Chamber of Commerce/Economic Development and the greater Montgomery County Business Community, The US Department of Agriculture, The US Department of Education, The NC Department of Public Instruction and the State Board of Education, The Golden Leaf Foundation, The Z. Smith Reynolds Foundation, The Friday Institute, Dream Builders, Curriculum Associates, Research Associates and The Evaluation Group, Energy United, The Duke Endowment, and First Health of the Carolinas.

I want to thank our wonderful partners for the many, many investments that have been made in the future of Montgomery County youth. Those advocating to secure the future of Montgomery County and our youth is plain to see. On behalf of everyone associated with Montgomery County Schools, a debt of gratitude is owed and we appreciate it. I also want to thank the Board of Education for their leadership and always pushing us to look for more and to do more for our children. And we will continue to do so. \$100 million and counting".

Chairman DeBerry then asked for a motion to go into closed session to discuss personnel. Bryan Dozier asked for the motion, with Sandra Miller seconding. The board approved entering into closed session unanimously.

After returning from closed session, Chairman DeBerry asked for a motion to adjourn the
meeting. With a motion by Jesse Hill and a second by Bryan Dozier, the meeting was duly
adjourned.
