- SHCs continue to vaccinate against the flu with quadravalent vaccine



Vaccines Given 2015-16 YTD – approximately 700



#### FirstHealth Dental Care

Providing comprehensive dental care to underserved children birth to 21 since 1998







### How did FirstHealth get into the Dental Business?

- School Health Nurses identified dental care as the # 1 unmet need for low-income children
- Medicaid reimbursement to private providers was very low
- High Medicaid patient no-show rate



### Dental Care Center Statistics

- Open on Mondays and Fridays, and one Saturday per month
- Served almost 7,000 children since center opened in January 1999
- Approximately 70% of children seen in the first year had either never seen a dentist or had not seen a dentist within the last year.



### FirstHealth Dental Care Statistics- Troy


- 95% Medicaid and Health Choice
- 5% uninsured (pay \$50 / visit)
- Kids n Crisis Funds (via FirstHealth Montgomery Foundation) help uninsured patients unable to pay
- 9% Caucasian, 19% African-American, 50% Hispanic, remaining 22% are other, 2 or more races, or unspecified




### Montgomery County Dental Facts

- Dental decay is the most common childhood chronic disease; more common than asthma or ADHD
- Almost 1 in 4 kindergartners in Montgomery County have untreated decay (2013-14 NC Oral Health Section data)
- 2015-16: 225 students at both SBHCs with no recorded dental home



- Deomonte Driver grew up in Prince George's County, Maryland, the 3rd of 5 boys
- From low-income family
- Always received primary medical care through a pediatrician – a medical home
- But not a dental home no primary care dentist
- Had long-standing tooth decay and abscess but never complained
- Mother could not find a dentist willing to accept Medicaid despite the Medicaid Managed Care Organization listing 27 dentists on their provider panel for that area





• Mid-January 2007 Deamonte complained of severe headaches

Pediatrician found tooth decay upon an oral exam

 Initially diagnosed as a sinus infection until later diagnosed as a brain infection


• Deamonte underwent 2 brain surgeries, experienced seizures, had 1 tooth extracted, and spent 6 weeks in the hospital before **dying** 

• Emergency treatment cost = \$250,000


Medicaid cost of simple extraction - \$62

 Medicaid cost of preventive services -\$226/year

### Oral Health is so Important to Overall Health!


- Thanks to The Duke Endowment, in the spring of 2017, we will expand the scope of services offered at both School-based Health Centers to include dental care by adding on two dental suites
- Dental suites will have 2 dental treatment rooms, x-ray room, and separate waiting room (to separate sick children from well children!)



### New FirstHealth School-based Health Centers Dental Program

- Funded by The Duke Endowment
- Purpose: Increase the percentage of children on Medicaid who receive preventive dental services
- Goal: Pilot several different models of school-based dental care in North Carolina and South Carolina to determine best practices for school-based dental care
- Perfect Fit: Montgomery County already has both a School-based Health Center and a Dental Care program

- North Carolina/South Carolina added at the request and funding of The Duke Endowment


Dr. Richard Kevin Lancaster




